I found that at least four of the key sounds from this pedal were foundational. That is, those four sounds will get me a lot of mileage and are not once-in-a-while special effects. So, for me this is four pedals in the space of two and about the price of two, and that's a bargain. From there, all the extra sounds are the occasional special effects that are the cherries on top. The controls are logical and provide a fair amount of flexibility. In some cases, the controls give you more variations than are available on the corresponding single-size pedal a juicy benefit. In other cases, like that of the MT2, the midrange controls aren't there, so middle boost or scooping is less tweakable a minor inconvenience. So, this would be the second improvement I would ask for from BOSS a middle control perhaps both level and frequency, please. As for the quality of the tone. If you are a boutique pedal junkie, then this won't be your main sound, but it might be all those others that you need to fill in the holes. Any minor differences that you perceive or more likely think you perceive can be tweaked with your EQ. In those cases you have to tweak things properly and use your brain a bit to get a dead-on reproduction of those pedals but it is by no means difficult to do and if you understand how to use tone controls properly you can do it in seconds. I don't know why Boss can develop and manufacture sophisticated digital signal processing models such as found in the OD20, but still can't manage to put a simple, cheap, true bypass circuit in their pedals. I suspect it's because Boss makes a separate line switching pedal the LS2 Line Selector that they don't want to make semi-obsolete by putting true bypass in their other pedals. For that reason, I don't want to give this thing a full 5 stars but think it deserves better than 4 stars, so I'm rounding up to 5 because there's no 4.5 stars option here.

If you play a fair bit with the pedal disengaged and are really picky about your tone, then you'll want to get a line switcher so you can truly bypass the OD20 when you're not using it. Other than that, this pedal is a stompbox dream it really does have accurate models of all those pedals in one box. Read or download the pdf for free. It is driven by 6 AA batteries or external power supply recommended and it feels stable and sturdy in its construction. The trick here is that it does it ONLY on notes below the D string. This is very useful for metal players who wanna add that extra depth in the sound. It's easy to adjust the settings on the fly and the memory bank system is a piece of cake to understand. It doesn't state anywhere that this pedal is true bypass, but my opinion is that it's true, since I can't hear a difference in the core sound whether it's connected or not. The amplifier section is intended to use straight into the mixing console, and this works but there are better amp emulators around.

Boss own pedals emulated are very good I can't tell no difference, this fact alone makes it a reason for buying this instead of a DS1 and a OD2 for instance. The emulation of Ibanez tubescreamer is also great. ProCos Rat is close but I think the original sounds a little bit warmer. It feels reliable, sturdy and it's good sounding. For this price, You get so much distortion that You can simulate nearly every tone possible. There aren't any particular drawbacks with this unit, except for those listed

All tone and selection knobs worked flawlessly. No annoying noises. I feel fortunate to have track down a dual pedal in such good shape I had been searching for over a year both in looks and functionality all mint close to brand new. It came in original box with appropriate serial numbers and manual. The thing is the price was right in line with todays going price for used BOSS OD 20. Though BOSS sold it as a thing that would give you all or most of their distortion and overdrive pedals in one, I find the OD20 doesnt really emulate them very well. The original version of those pedals sound better to my ears. It failed at those things so was discontinued. What the OD20 does really well, at least mine, is emulate Fuzz Face, Octave Fuzz, Big Muff and Rat very well. In other words this box is best used for wild distortion, fuzz and octave effects. A low octave boost pot adds heavy depth on tap. Theres a BOSS MT2 emulation that also rocks. Switching between them is not the most elegant, I dont recommend it if youre trying to switch between 2 sounds back and forth quickly. But if you set your amp at a warm clean sound, you can go from that to wild mad fuzz in a

stomp. Add an overdrive pedal for something in between or use a clean and an overdrive channel in your amp. Did I mention the OD20 can also switch your amps channels for you. Great if you don't have the original switch for your two channel amp. It's sturdy and reliable, it's a tank. Non stop fuzz face and big muff emulation.

Pretty straight forward other than the programming and even that wasn't too bad once you play with it a little and get use to it. Very versatile and sounds great. Shipped right away and came on time. I dig it I'm sure you will too. I do suggest getting a power cord about 10 bucks or expect to use a lot of batteries. Good choice for beginners. Rather than switch guitars for a seven string for a song or two or play a baritone the heavy octave feature is incredible, creating a thick heavy sound without mud. The overdrives and distortions are some of the best modeled I've ever heard, way beyond line 6. Perhaps it is because Boss only really used COSM to recreate their own signature pedal sounds. The team behind the BigSky contains some of the modelling masterminds who had created the Line 6 Stompbox Modeler range a decade previously, and the ethos behind Strymon's bigbox pedal is similar, but more refined. Shimmer adds highly adjustable pitch shifted tones, while Swell brings the reverb or dry signal in gradually like a volume pedal.

With 300 presets, the BigSky is well designed for live use, too, and all in all, it's no wonder many players consider it to be the greatest digital reverb pedal ever made. The first delay pedal to use

Boss's compact enclosure, the DM2 is now a bonafide classic among pedal enthusiasts. Boss tweaked the design on numerous occasions, and there are now considered to be three different versions, all revered for their warm analogue tone. The first version used the MN3005 BBD, which was soon switched to the MN3205 BBD, with the third iteration also seeing different PCB markings. Featuring three dials for Repeat Rate, Echo and Intensity, this analogue tonemachine is able to produce delay times ranging from 30 to 300 milliseconds and its limited frequency response gives the pedal its warm characteristics and enveloping tone. The DM3 comes in at a lower price point on the used market, but some prefer the cleaner nature of its repeats. It uses a very simple circuit with a single opamp and two germanium diodes, while also outputting more gain 46.5dB than its competitors, namely the BOSS DS1 35dB and Tube Screamer 41dB. First introduced in 1981, the CS2 Compression Sustainer was a development on the circuit found in the CS1, and used a VCA voltage-controlled amplifier instead of the photocouplers found in the CS1. The implementation of the VCA chip sped up the signal processing of the circuit, which in turn made the attack faster than that of the CS1. Following the success of the CS3, which was introduced in '86, the CS2 was discontinued in 1989, but vintage iterations of this iconic squeezebox can now fetch north of 200 on Reverb.com. The CS3 remains Boss's only compression pedal still in production, yet we remain hopeful for a WAZA Craft reissue of the CS2 in 2019. By slowing down one of two playback reel tapes by around 20ms, the time delay causes a flanging effect.

The Electric Mistress allowed players to take this tape-manipulating sound out of the studio and onto the bandstand. There were numerous design changes, alongside minor changes to the schematic and a varying range of PCBs; the most commonly seen features a large green font. A filter matrix switch was added in 1977 and the introduction of the Deluxe version followed in 1978, sold alongside the standard version until the early 80s. Early models are famed for their fluid characteristics and chorus flanging. Famous for its low noise and hard edge, the DS1 initially featured a Toshiba TA7136AP preamp chip, not an opamp, during its early production days in Japan. This model is easily distinguishable due to its silver screw and long dash. These chips were still manufactured in Japan, but resulted in a lower output and more transparent drive. Its more recent revisions have come within the past two decades once in 2000, when both the pedal and chip Mitsubishi opamp were made in Taiwan, and finally in 2006, when a New Japan Radio NJM2904L opamp became the primary chip. Cheap, cheerful and ubiquitous, you'd be hard pressed to find a better meat-and-potatoes distortion at this price point. However, if you belong to the school of thought that compressors should add real texture and flavour to your tone, then look no further than this iconic red stompbox from MXR. Featuring two straightforward Output and Sensitivity controls, for volume and compression respectively, the Dyna Comp became an immediate hit, favoured by the likes of Bonnie Raitt and Lowell George, before landing at the feet of David Gilmour and Andy Summers. Strum a big open chord and you'll hear an entirely different tone on top of the expected attack and decay. Both pedals, particularly box logo models from the early 1970s, have a sound that is close enough that only the keenest compressor aficionados can tell the difference, resulting in a continuation of the classic Dyna Comp sound.

The little orange box is more than just a phaser, it's the phaser, and has become totally synonymous with the effect. It's a purely cosmetic difference, however, and the two pedals were identical under the hood. The original MXR company went bankrupt in 1984, but Dunlop produces a variety of Phase 90 variants and reissues today. First introduced in 1989 by IVL Technologies, the now ubiquitous Whammy was a gamechanger in the stompbox world. A simple pitchshifter controlled by an integrated expression pedal, this revolutionary metal box introduced guitarists to a new world of strange and esoteric guitar playing. With only this dirty dozen ever existing, they're extremely rare and if you were to stumble across this particular rodent, you should immediately escort it to the Natural History Museum. This model is commonly known as the Whiteface RAT. The Tone Bender was originally designed and made by guitar technician Gary Hurst, who had previously worked for

Vox and later for the Macari brothers. Legend has it that session ace Vic Flick of James Bond theme fame came into the Macari's shop complaining his Maestro FuzzTone lacked the sustain he needed, so Hurst offered to build him something better. By taking the FuzzTone circuit and beefing up the voltage from three to nine volts, the result gave Flick the singing sustain he wanted. It has been through many iterations, and made under many brand names, including Sola Sound, Colorsound, JMI, Vox and Marshall as the Supa Fuzz, but whatever the name, it remains a quintessential fuzz. Boss has continued to update the CE series and in 2016, debuted a modernised CE2 in its highend WAZA Craft range. Boss's chorus practically defines 80s guitar; use a vintage CE1 today and you may be surprised to find it sounds every bit as beguiling as its successors.

Line 6 had only been around for three years, and had enjoyed considerable success thanks to its revolutionary POD ampmodelling unit, but the fourswitch Stompbox Modeler range represented a concerted effort to invade the pedalboards of serious musicians. While the MM4 Modulation Modeler and FM4 Filter Modeler have their fans, the DL4 Delay Modeler became an unprecedented hit, and it wasn't long before seemingly every guitarist on the planet had this big green box on their pedalboards. Some went even further, basing their entire sound on the DL4's widescreen atmospheric capabilities and seemingly endless well of inspiration. There's also the oft forgotten looper function, which allows you to sample, reverse and slow down your repeats as needed. More accurate and versatile units have followed, but there's something about the way the DL4 works that is enduring, and uniquely inspirational. This probably wasn't what Bill Finnegan envisioned when he had the ingenious idea to use a highfidelity, lownoise preamp in an overdrive pedal back in 1990. The result was the Klon Centaur a wonderful overdrive and boost that offers a widescreen frequency range and addictive touch responsiveness. The scarcity of supply 8,000 or so were produced between 1994 and the end of production in 2000 meant that they soon began to skyrocket on the used market. If you can afford it and can find one, you won't want to switch it off. This was done by cascading the circuit into additional sections, each one clipped by twin diodes. However, when you clip, the tone can be a bit raspy. The BBD chips were responsible for achieving an analogue warmth and tapelike echo that guitarists fell for, but ElectroHarmonix didn't stop there. So in addition to an effected output, the Deluxe also sported an output for the dry signal, and there was a Level control to tweak the intensity of the effect. These early wahs were beloved by many players, not least Jimi Hendrix, but they were often unreliable and inconsistent.

Enter Jim Dunlop. Seeing an opportunity to expand Dunlop Manufacturing's remit from accessories to effects, Jim bought the brand and, alongside engineer Sam McRae, set about fixing many of the build and reliability issues, while preserving the allimportant tone.
